- anyone interested in nature

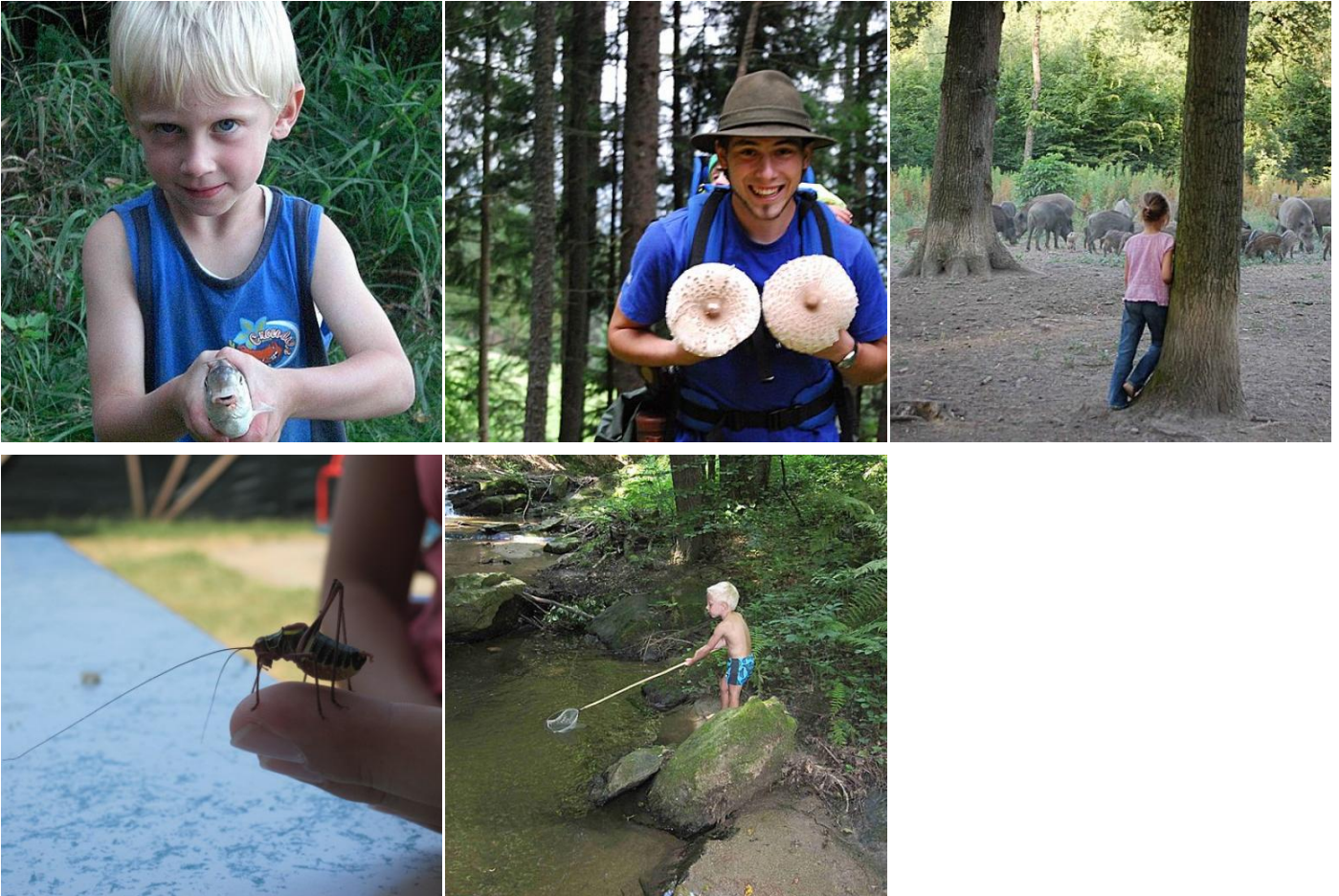
What can I do?

- once through the forest with a magnifying glass
- You can find lots of forest games on the Internet
- Pack tree trunks as an adventure trail
- walk through the forest without shoes and socks
- go in search of clues
- Forest menu à la season
- Forest species - let your creativity run wild
- Imitate animals or play animal games
- Take a close look at wood
- ...

What to look out for?

- Observe the legal situation in the respective country
 - Austria
 - Do not enter forest crops (=seedlings) & young forest under 3m height
 - Observe closed areas (forestry & hunting) (period and reason for closure must be posted)
- ask the landowner for permission if necessary
- avoid making too much noise (the quieter you are, the more animals you will see)
- Take waste back home with you
